


Messages from the Stream

From Pastor Kent's Desk

When I was in Punxsy, I used to put together a reading list for our July/ August newsletter. Summer is a time to catch-up on your reading and it's fun to have some



suggestions from an allegedly trustworthy source. I don't do "beach books," so my picks tend to be more traditional in nature; a little theology, some spirituality, and lots of fun stuff. (Hey, it's summer, after all.) So, here are some suggestions for this year:

Days of Awe and Wonder: How to Be a Christian in the 21st Century By Marcus J. Borg HarperOne, 271 pp.: Marcus Borg is one of my favorite theologians, in no small part because he writes in a style which is accessible to everyone. This is a collection of his pivotal writings (he passed away in 2015), interviews, and previously unpublished works from one of the most influential theologians of our time on what it means to be a Christian today. I've found him to be both refreshing and insightful. He'll push you and make you think about your faith in new ways.

Jesus The Savior: The Meaning of Jesus Christ for Christian Faith By William C. Placher WJK, 230 pp.: William Placher is also a wonderful theologian, but one with a more traditional bent. A Presbyterian, Placher was a professor of Humanities/Philosophy and Religion at Wabash College in Indiana. "Theology," he writes, "is a word that scares off many people, but "theology" really just means reflecting on faith, and I'm convinced many people want to do that. So, I've tried to write a book for anyone who wants to learn more concerning what Christianity has to say about Jesus." He succeeds in a most winsome way!

Jesus: A Pilgrimage By James Martin, SJ HarperOne, 526 pp.: At 526 pages, I guess this can be considered a "beach book!" It's not designed to be read in a week at the beach, but rather savored and allowed to work its magic on you. Rev. James Martin is a Jesuit priest, editor at large of America magazine, and bestselling author. It is written as a travelogue through the Holy Land, the diary of two priests on a pilgrimage to encounter Jesus. Each of the stops along their journey constitutes a chapter in the book: Bethlehem, Nazareth, Jordan, Bethesda, Capernaum, and many more. Part travelogue and part journal, Jesus: A Pilgrimage is an enchanting and spiritually moving journey through a land full of wisdom and mystery.

Searching for Happiness: How Generosity, Faith, and Other Spiritual Habits Can Lead to a Full Life By Martin Thielen, WJK, 167 pp.: The key to happiness is being rich, successful, and beautiful . . . right? Thielen insists that this is far from the truth! A United Methodist pastor from Tennessee, he uses psychological research, personal anecdotes, and Scripture to describe ten practices that do contribute to happiness in an easy-to-read book. It's a fun read and you'll learn something about yourself and happiness along the way.

Falling Upward: A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life By Richard Rohr, Jossey-Bass, 199 pp.: In Falling Upward, Father Richard Rohr offers a new paradigm for understanding one of the most profound of life's mysteries: how our failings can be the foundation for our ongoing spiritual growth. With rare insight, he takes us on a journey to give

us an understanding of how the heartbreaks, disappointments, and first loves of life are actually stepping stones to the spiritual joys that the second half of life has in store for us. A most insightful and wisdom-filled book.

Grounded: Finding God in the World A Spiritual Revolution By Diana Butler Bass, HarperOne, 323 pp.: Bass writes, "Where is God?" is one of the most consequential questions of our times. People believe, but they believe differently than they once did. The theological ground is moving; a spiritual revolution is afoot." Grounded guides us through our contemporary spiritual habitat by paying attention to the ways in which people experience a God who animates creation and community. A wonderful primer on the changing nature of our understanding of who God is, in and for the contemporary world.

The following authors are some of the ones I read for fun. I won't single out any author in particular; they are all excellent and can speak for themselves. Read them all, and you will travel around the globe. Each of their novels is written in "series" fashion, so be sure to start with the first book in the series!

- **Donna Leon** uses Venice for the setting of her Commissario Guido Brunetti Mysteries. Makes you want to visit Venice in person. Brunetti is wonderful.
- Louise Penny is a Canadian whose Inspector Gamache Novels are set in Quebec. A superb writer of mysteries. You will not be disappointed.
- Alexander McCall Smith's NO.1 Ladies' Detective Agency Novels take place in Botswana. (He himself lives in Scotland.) Sweet, gentle novels, full of humanity.
- **Steven F. Havill's** Posadas County Mysteries unfold in the sunny southwestern corner of New Mexico. You'll fall in love with Posadas County and green burritos!
- **David Rosenfelt** pens the Andy Carpenter Mysteries which are set in New Jersey. Funny, smart, and gripping.
- **J.A. Jance's** Joanna Brady Novels are set out west in Cochise County, Arizona. Atmospheric and full of action! Well worth the read.
- **Phillip Gulley's** novels about the Quaker Meeting in Harmony, Indiana, and its Pastor, Sam Gardner, are priceless! Full of humor, humility, and humanity, they are stories "ripped from the pews" of countless congregations. Your sides will split, your eyes will tear-up, and your heart will be strangely warmed!

There are enough books here to keep you in reading for at least four summers! Remember, they are merely suggestions from an inveterate reader who has mined his library for reading options to make your summer extra-special. So, enjoy, and don't get sunburned at the beach!





The Confession of 1967

This summer marks the 50th anniversary of the adoption of The Confession of 1967 by the 179th General Assembly (1967) (UPCUSA.) In approving the Confession of 1967, the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America adopted its first new confession of faith in three centuries. The turbulent decade of the 1960's challenged churches everywhere to restate their faith. While the Second Vatican council was reformulating Roman Catholic thought and practice, Presbyterians were developing the Confession of 1967.

In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself...

Modestly titled, the Confession of 1967 is built around a single passage of Scripture: "In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself . . ." The Confession addresses the church's role in the modern world. Responsive to developments in biblical scholarship, it asks the church to

"approach the Scriptures with literary and historical understanding." It calls the church to obedient action, particularly in response to social problems such as racial discrimination, nationalistic arrogance, and family and class conflict. It sees the life, death, resurrection, and promised coming of Jesus Christ as the pattern for the church's mission today, and calls on all Christians to be reconciled to God and to one another.

Fifty years later, the Confession of 1967 is still speaking with dignity and purpose to a church which finds itself in a continuing dialogue with a world in flux. We will be using portions of the Confession of 1967 as our Affirmation of Faith in worship during the month of July.

Sunday Chancel Flowers: Sunday, chancel flowers are placed in honor, memory, or special occasion of a person(s) by a family or friend(s) of Bethany.
